In the first months of the year we supported Gum Health Week. These carried the message, "Healthy Mouth - Healthy Body." This campaign reached all the Latin American countries. We also supported the 5K Walk for Oral Health held in the Dominican Republic.

This year, we have also been working with the LAOHA Cariology Group on the Consensus on Cariology in Latin American countries. In addition, COHI participated in the "Call for Action: Caries Consensus for the countries of LATAM and the Caribbean," held on October 14, the World Cavity-Free Future Day. Another event organized by COHI in conjunction with the Dom<mark>inican College of Dentis</mark>ts was the Symposium, "Oral and Systemic Health: Relationship between Oral Health and Systemic Health." This event had simultaneous translation and transmission through the Zoom platform, so dentists from all over the region were able to participate virtually.

An important achievement to highlight this year is that after a call for scholarships, a new doctoral fellow who is studying at the University of São Paulo was selected. With these scholarships, COHI makes a contribution to the different countries of the region. The aim is to carry out quality research in different areas of dentistry. I am especially grateful to the members of the executive committee and collaborators of COHI for all their dedication and determination during this year as we work in order to achieve positive changes in the population's oral health in the Caribbean region.

Gum Health Week



From Monday, May 9 to Friday, May 13, the Latin American Oral Health Association (LAOHA) and the Caribbean Oral Health Initiative (COHI) carried out the campaign, "Take Care of Your Gums: Healthy Mouth, Healthy Body," led by the Group of LAOHA Periodontics.

During this week, we shared videos and multiple infographics on social networks with the aim of raising awareness and warning about periodontal diseases and their relationship with systemic diseases. These materials were disseminated by various dental societies throughout Latin America, including active participation from Caribbean countries.

This campaign was unique in that it allowed for personalization. The message was adapted to the country of dissemination, including logos of local societies that joined forces with this initiative. Likewise, dentists, dental clinics, and universities had the materials at their disposal to share them through their social networks.

Each day of the week had a particular theme:

Monday, May 9: Opening ceremony. Wellness and Oral Health.

Tuesday, May 10: Recognition of Signs and Early Action.

Wednesday, May 11: Oral Health during Pregnancy

Thursday, May 12: World Gum Health Day **Friday, May 13**: Diabetes and Oral Health

Among the activities, a Gingival Health Self-test was included, accessed with a QR code, through which the participant was informed about their risk level of developing periodontal diseases from multiple-choice questions. Likewise, the self-test gave suggestions of the next steps to follow to achieve good periodontal health.

Additionally, as the campaign's closure, health professionals were offered the opportunity to join and sign the "Manifesto for the Promotion of Periodontal Health of the Ibero-Pan-American Federation of Periodontics (FIPP) and the Latin American Oral Health Association (LAOHA)."

5K Walk for Oral Health

On Sunday, May 15, the first walk for oral health was held in the Dominican Republic. It was organized by the Dominican College of Dentists (CDO) the Dominican Society of Periodontics and Dental Implants (SODOPERIO), the Caribbean Oral Health Initiative (COHI), Allies for Dominican Oral Health, and Operation Smile.

This activity was carried out in the Mirador Sur park, where dentists, accompanied by family and friends, came together to show their support. COHI directly supported the activity, having an active participation in it. The objective was to raise awareness among the population about the importance of oral health, emphasizing how oral health affects general health and the relevance of having a healthy mouth to have a healthy body. Hence, COHI's motto for the walk was: Healthy Mouth = Healthy Body.


This was a hybrid activity with simultaneous translation into English, where professionals from different countries in the region were able to participate.







Call for action (2nd edition) Consensus on Caries for Latin American Countries





The Cariology Group of the Latin American Oral Health Association (LAOHA) celebrated the "World Cavity-Free Future Day," on October 15.

The initiative, originally conceived by the Alliance for a Cavity Free Future, was commemorated with a Virtual Symposium entitled, "Call to Action: Caries Consensus for the Countries of LATAM and the Caribbean." The objective of this Symposium was to present the result of the initiative to prevent and control dental caries in the countries of Latin America and the Caribbean (LACC: Latin American and Caribbean Countries).

The pillars defined as part of the regional challenge were the following:

- · Collect information on policies/guidelines on fluoridated toothpastes and management of the consumption of free sugars for the prevention of caries.
- Discuss the development of a cariology core curriculum at LACC.

Dr. Fabio Sampaio: Action 3 - Development of a Consensus for the Teaching of Dental Caries in Brazilian Dental Schools.



World Diabetes Day

On November 14, World Diabetes Day was commemorated, for which the LAOHA Periodontology Group, in collaboration with COHI and Colgate-Palmolive, carried out an awareness campaign highlighting the link between oral health and systemic well-being.

The initiative was supported by the Latin American Diabetes Association (ALAD), the National Institute of Diabetes, Endocrinology and Nutrition of the Dominican Republic (INDEN) and various dental societies in Latin America, such as the Ibero-Pan American Federation of Periodontics (FIPP)., the Latin American Dental Federation (FOLA), among other entities.

The campaign used social network platforms, especially Instagram, through which societies, as well as dentists in particular, were able to share the following tools in three different languages, Spanish, English, and Portuguese:

- Selfie photos with a special filter carrying a commemorative message of this day.
- Infographics and animations in various formats.
- Video of Dr. José E. Costa Gil, president of the Latin American Diabetes Association.
- Video of Dr. Jenny Cepeda, diabetologist and senior researcher at Unibe.

- Video of Dr. Giuseppe Romito, periodontist, tenured professor and deputy director of the School of Dentistry of the University of São Paulo.
- Video of Dr. Nidia Castro, periodontist and professor at the University of Guarulhos and the Forsyth Institute.







Workshop: Aspects Related to the Implementation of the Latin American Consensus on Teaching in Cariology

During the month of November, with the support of COHI and LAOHA, we held the workshop, "Aspects related the implementation of the Latin American Consensus on Teaching in Cariology." It was presented by Dr. Stefania Martignon, Sofía Jácome, Andrea Cortés and Angie Sanabria from Universidad El Bosque in Colombia and also Dr. Ninoska Abreu, current president of COHI, from the Universidad Iberoamericana in the Dominican Republic. This academic activity was carried out in two different contexts, the first aimed at educators and the second at directors and deans of dental schools.



The workshop for educators was held at the Universidad Iberoamericana, and cariology teachers (theory and practice) from all dental schools in the Dominican Republic participated. In the same way, the workshop for directors and deans of dentistry in Latin America was held at the meeting and assembly of the Organization of Faculties and Schools of Dentistry (OFEDO) in Punta Cana, Dominican Republic.

As part of the workshop, the participants heard an explanation of the process of developing the Latin American Consensus on Teaching in Cariology carried out by the LAOHA cariology group. Also, they worked in teams to actively discuss the current situation of teaching in cariology in the participating institutions and the changes that must be made in the different faculties in order to implement the consensus.














Meet our new Fellow Dr. Raysa Álvarez
